### 7. OBJETIVO GENERAL DE LA ASIGNATURA

The postgraduate seminar Media discourse attempts to study two main approaches to the study of the interaction that occurs in written newspapers: critical discourse analysis and appraisal theory. It aims at investigating, describing and analysing appraisal as present in written media discourse, both at a functional and at an ideological level as proposed by Fairclough and Martin and Rose. The seminar is of particular relevance at a time of changing social parameters and opening up modes of communication to vox populi. It is therefore relevant to familiarize students with two relevant perspectives to the study of written media discourse which offer new paradigms and methodologies to describe media genre. Students are expected to become aware that news readers no longer read in isolation, but are able to comment on their readings via a website, email, or posts on a social network for others to discuss. They are expected to become aware that readers can respond by assuming an appraising attitude or an ideologically critical attitude of the social representation of social actors in the written media.

However, the seminar aims at not only examining two of the fundamental theoretical approaches to the study of written media discourse and but also their relevance as authentic material in language teaching

The course has the format of a seminar where the sessions are organized on the basis of presentations and discussions of the topics associated with the contents of the course. Presentations and discussions are based on readings done by the students along the course. The presentations include the reading of chapters on the two most relevant theoretical issues and approaches to media discourse and their application in the classroom as authentic material

# 8. OBJETIVOS ESPECÍFICOS DE LA ASIGNATURA

In this seminar students are expected to develop abilities to

- 1. Identify, describe and explain current fundamental theoretical approaches to the language of the written media within the framework of Critical Discourse Analysis and Appraisal theory.
- 2. Identify interpret and evaluate the methodological designs that underlie the studied theoretical approaches
- 3. Analyze and evaluate research done in media discourse
- 4. Present and discuss topics on the language of written media discourse
- 5. Analyze and interpret data and project their pedagogical application

Students are expected to do their readings within the assigned weekly reading schedule of their presentations and to formulate relevant questions and comments on the topics discussed in class.

#### Weekly readings

Students will be assigned weekly readings on the topics assigned in the program. They will have access to the readings in pdf format on the web site of the course and will be able to save a digital copies or print them as needed.

**Final project:** Students will have to turn-in a final project for which they will be given a choice, such as, writing a book review, a short article, a thesis project, etc.
