4. GENERAL OBJECTIVES OF THE MODULE

- To obtain a general view of the literary manifestations during the European Middle Ages, with special emphasis on Medieval English Literature.
- To examine key concepts and texts from the period.
- To appreciate the links and differences between the different works.
- To comprehend the relationship between the literary texts and the historical context in which they were produced.

5. SPECIFIC OBJETIVES OF THE MODULE

- To get a sense of the features of Old English literature starting with the Elegies and ending with *Beowulf*.
- To explore the work of one of the key authors of medieval English literature, Geoffrey Chaucer.
- To understand the genre of medieval romance through the analysis of the Breton lay *Sir Orfeo* and the Middle English romance *Sir Gawain and the Green Knight*.
- To study the development of Middle English drama starting with *Noah's Flood* and ending with *Everyman*.
- To understand the relationship between Middle English literature and the work of certain medieval European authors such as Marie de France, Giovanni Boccaccio and Christine de Pizan.
